Message from the president

Dear Members and friends of GCAA,

We recently celebrated our first GCAA Chinese New Year event, and it was a success beyond our expectations. When we first set out to organize this event, we had hoped we would have a turn-out twice that for the Mid-Autumn Festival which was almost 150. But we really didn't know what to expect. There was concern early on about being able to cover our expenses if we rented space, booked performances and ordered food for as many as 300 but the attendance fell short. As it turned out, the success and growth of our Association in such a short time was much stronger than we realized and the interest in the CNY event far exceeded our expectations. We were thrilled about the enthusiastic response and did what we could to accommodate as many as physically, legally and logistically possible. While we are unable to accommodate all who wanted to attend, we stretched our space and volunteer resources to the limit and accommodated 380 participants. By any measure, it was a great success, thanks to our hardworking and invaluable volunteers and officers. We had no historic data to gauge and learned much from this experience. If you are interested in attending future GCAA events, we hope we can count on you to let us know of your interest by sending in your reservation (RSVP) ASAP so that we can plan ahead and attempt to accommodate everyone.

When you volunteer and actively participate, you feel like you are a part of the organization instead of feeling alienated. You also help make GCAA a better organization and provide the support we need in order to host the programs everyone enjoy. The lack of volunteers and pre-event attendance info combine to create uncertainty and logistics difficulties. We aim always to provide the best service possible with our limited resources and as we grow, the inability to accommodate all, from time to time, is inevitable, especially if we don't have all the volunteers we need. I know you will understand and I appreciate being able to count on you to be part of the solution.

The Gulfcoast Chinese American Association (GCAA) and the U.S.-China People's Friendship Association (USCPFA) are pleased to announce the second in their series of Chinese film showings. Each movie will be briefly introduced by Dr. Carolyn Bloomer, who will describe the historical context and interesting facts about the film. Dr. Bloomer is a cultural anthropologist specializing in Chinese culture, who is currently writing a book about Chinese films. There will be time after each film for discussion.

Martial Arts Film Classics of the 1960s and 1970s

1:30: *The Assassin* (Da Cike 大刺客), Hong Kong, 1967, 112min

Directed by Zheng Che, perhaps the most famous director of 1960s *wuxia* films (*One Armed Swordsman*, *Golden Swallow*), and starring Wang Yu, an equally famous actor. During the Warring States period, Nie Zheng is a student at a school for training commoners in sword-fighting, where his master bequeaths him the sword of one who committed suicide with it while serving the state of Chu. When the Master is murdered, Nie knows his skill and strong body are made to serve a higher purpose. Eventually, he conspires with a rich nobleman to fulfill his destiny by taking on a suicide mission to assassinate the Premier. Elegant and moody cinematography; includes strong women characters.

3:45: *Dirty Ho* (Lantou He 烂头何), Hong Kong, 1979. 97 min.

A masterpiece from director Lau Kar-leong, one of the best kung fu action directors of the 1970s. The Eleventh Prince, traveling incognito as Wang, a jewelry merchant, is beset upon by Ho, an ill-mannered thief, to whom he administers a poisonous head wound. As Wang is the only person who has the antidote to the poison, Ho is bound to stay with him until the wound is healed, during which time he learns improved kung fu skills and better morals. In the meantime, the prince is the subject of various plots by rivals to the throne. The production is imaginative, beautifully designed and choreographed, and the kung fu is witty and fun to watch as it ramifies into the smallest actions. The mutual interdependence of yin-yang forces in kung fu styles is a theme of the film.

The New Chinese Woman: Calendar Posters in 1930s Shanghai

A Ringling School Library Association Lecture on March 29, 2006
by (our very own erudite and entertaining) Dr. Carolyn M Bloomer, Ph.D.

In Shanghai in the 1920s and '30s, wildly popular calendar posters and advertisements, magazines and movies, promoted a glamorous vision of the modern Chinese woman. This confident and materialistic new creature wore fashionable westernized clothing and hair styles; she used brand-name soaps, cosmetics, medicines, and mosquito repellants, she smoked British and American cigarettes, and her (sometimes scantily clothed) image was used to promote flashlights, sugar, sewing thread, textiles, and other products made by both Chinese and foreign manufacturers (including Palmolive, Standard Oil, J.P. Coates, and the British American Tobacco Company).

The male artists who produced these posters were themselves influenced in various ways by western illustration styles in magazines such as *Ladies Home Journal* and *Illustrated London News*, and by publicity photographs of popular western film actresses, elements of which they integrated with traditional Chinese compositions and symbols. Interestingly, later – in the 50s and 60s -- these illustration styles would be used by the Communist Party in posters promoting a new socialist China.

Now a highly collectible genre, these posters present a fascinating historical study. In addition to the images accompanying her lecture, Dr. Bloomer will bring several posters from her personal collection, one of which she will present to the Library.

TEFLON RISK

The EPA ruled that exposure to a chemical used to make Teflon, commonly used as a coating for non-stick cookware, could put your health at risk. Even low levels of the chemical, (perfluorooctanoic acid and its salts, known as PFOA, or C-8, used in the manufacturing process) targets the liver, increase total cholesterol and triglycerides, which might increase the likelihood of a heart attack or stroke. These substances are also implicated as cancer inducing.

DuPont has agreed to pay up to \$343 million 9/04 to settle a class-action lawsuit involving residents around an Ohio Valley Teflon-producing plant.

For those of you who want to avoid these toxic chemicals altogether, ceramic-coated metal cookware or stoneware is a recommended alternative. The ceramic is virtually inert and will not transfer any metal ions to the food you cook or release toxic chemicals into the air. Please don't contact me for where to buy the ceramic cookware because I do not have that info.

If you do choose to use Teflon-coated cookware, NEVER heat it to high temperatures, as this appears to release more of the toxic emissions.

NutraSweet/aspartame artificial sweetener

Although aspartame contains two amino acids it is not a natural substance. Free form aspartic acid is a damaging neuro excitotoxin.

Interestingly, the FDA regards adverse reactions like seizures to products containing aspartame as only anecdotal idiosyncrasies that do not have to be reported because of aspartame's "Generally Recognized as Safe" classification.

The methyl ester joining aspartic acid and phenylalanine is metabolized to a two potent neurotoxins methanol and formaldehyde. This is not insignificant as the digestion of aspartame yields 10% methanol by weight.

Additionally, the vast majority of the "scientific" studies used to support the safety of aspartame products were funded by the manufacturer. It may be prudent to avoid aspartame (and saccharin, which has been shown to cause bladder cancer in lab animals)

Keeping out spammers

Q I have a problem with receiving unsolicited e-mails coming to my mailbox, and some are very obscene. In the past I have entered some contests and even requested some info from a Web site, which, of course, asked for my e-mail address. Shortly thereafter I start getting unsolicited e-mails from organizations that I have never heard of, and some of these are very offensive. I added the addresses from these organizations to my "blocked" message file and even set up rules that will delete a message if it has specific "obscene" words. This worked only for a short time. I have also tried to stop their e-mails by sending them a request to do so, but seem to get only more of this mail. Is there some way to block these organizations from sending such e-mails to my Internet address?

A Please don't take offense M.D.H., but a great way to limit the amount of spam pouring into one's inbox is to read your note and do the opposite.

Do not respond to offers for contests or free newsletters or reminder services or anything else you encounter where they ask for your e-mail address.

Next, no matter how irked you get, never send an angry response or even a civil request to be removed from a list. Spam mongers delight in selling the return addresses on such missives to other spam creators.

Also do not expect that your efforts to set up e-mail software rules to block notes with certain buzzwords will succeed. Spam makers simply put in subject lines and body type that avoid hot-button language to slip past spam blockers.

Finally, keep in mind that the more you send and receive messages over the Web, the more likely it is that spammers with address-sniffing software will get an address.

The best way to fix your particular situation is to abandon the e-mail account now polluted by spammers. Start over with a setup where you get at least two accounts -- use one for the things you really care about and the other to do things on the Web that you know might make that account a spam magnet.

With free e-mail accounts being handed out like Halloween candy, it is simple to set up multiple e-mail accounts.

Google, Yahoo and America Online all offer free e-mail accounts that make setting up decoys a snap. I recommend that you pick one and then set up several accounts and use them for different purposes.

The main account should be given to friends, family and others from whom you want to hear. Use it sparingly to avoid address sniffers.

A second account can then be used for those times when some Web site demands an e-mail account before providing something you want.

I like to use a third alias for business-related stuff to keep my personal life separate from workplace chaos.

I urge you to set up your own set of identities and drop me an e-mail saying it's done. Be sure to use one of your aliases..
